

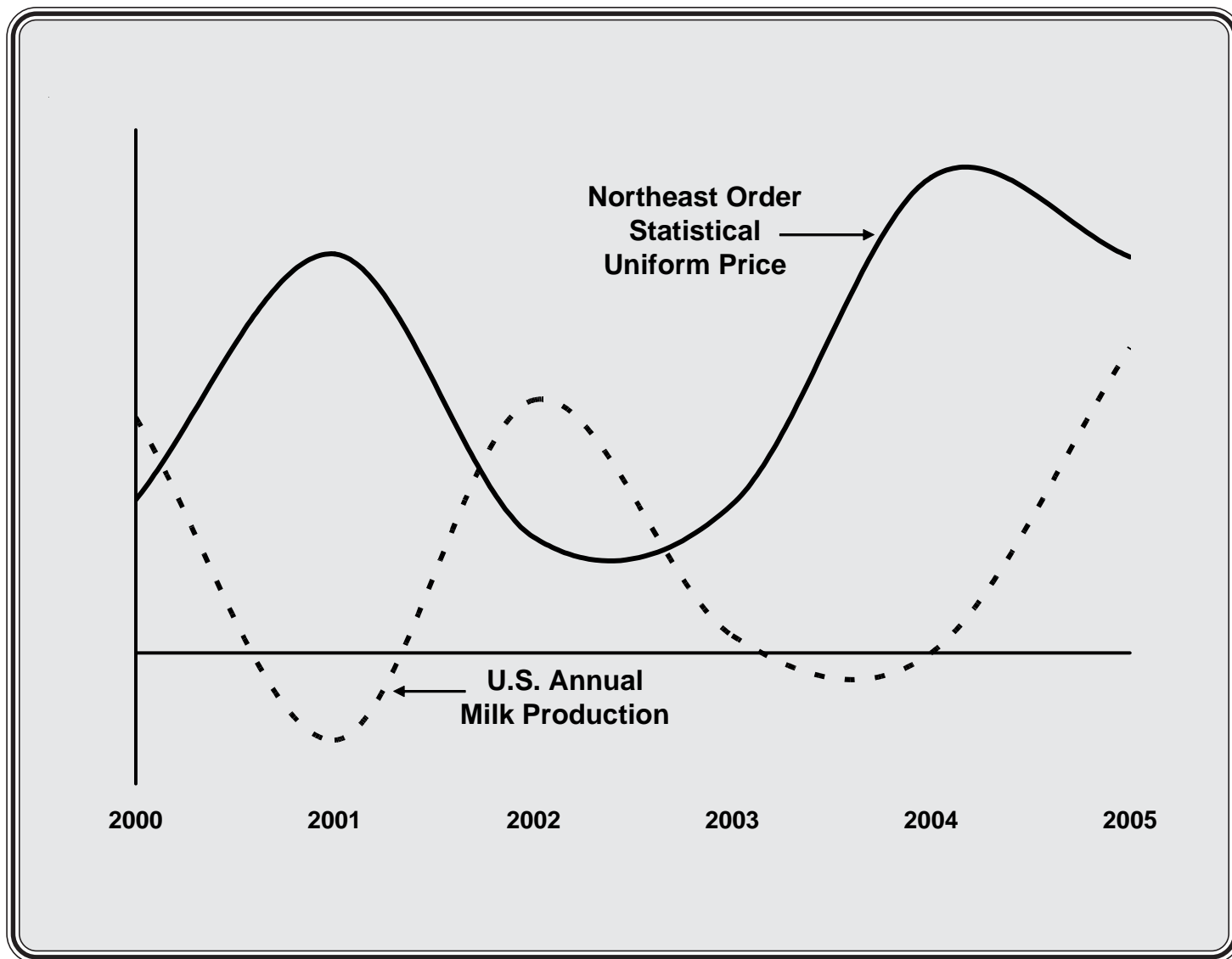

Summary

This bulletin provides information about the operation of the Northeast Order during 2005 through a series of tables and charts. The *Bulletin* Highlights section summarizes important events that impacted the dairy industry in 2005. Also included are lists of handlers and cooperatives operating under the Order.

Producer Milk Receipts Higher in 2005

During 2005, the volume of milk received from producers shipping to handlers regulated under the Northeast Order totaled 23.6 billion pounds, an increase of 4.2 percent from 2004. The average number of producers declined only 0.9 percent, while average daily deliveries per producer (DDP) increased 5.1 percent. Milk production started bouncing back in May of 2005. Nationally, milk production grew an average 4.6 percent each month during the last 8 months of the year. In the Northeast Order's main contributing states (New York, Pennsylvania, and Vermont), the average production increases were 4.8 percent, 5.9 percent, and 2.4 percent during the same period. No milk was depooled during 2005.

The simple average number of producers equaled 135 less than 2004. This decline is less than last year, but is also skewed by the depooling that occurred in 2004. This resulted in a lower annual average than would have occurred had there not been any depooling. The year ended with 430 less producers than at the end of 2004.

Class Utilization Changes

Class I utilization averaged 45.0 percent in 2005, a decrease of 2.2 percentage points from the previous year. The total volume of milk used in Class I decreased slightly (0.5 percent), but because of a larger volume of producer milk receipts, the change was accentuated. Class II usage increased 6.2 percent, but because of the overall volume increase only resulted in a utilization increase of 0.4 percentage points.

Class III volume grew 1.8 percent, but when compared to the increase in total producer milk receipts, the utilization dropped 0.6 percentage points. In actuality, the 2005 Class III volume was less than the previous year. Over 650 million pounds were depooled during April, May, and June of 2004. If that milk had been included on the Order, the 2005 Class III volume would have shown a decline of over 9.0 percent. Less milk was used in Class III partially due to the closure of cheese manufacturing facilities. The amount of milk used in Class IV jumped 28.6 percent in 2005; utilization increased 2.3 percentage points. This was mainly due to the change in the Order in May 2004 that reclassified milk used to produce evaporated milk or sweetened condensed as Class IV instead of Class III.

Prices Lower

As mentioned above, national milk production started to gain momentum during early spring of 2005.

With the tightness in milk easing, prices began to decline. All federal order class prices averaged less than 2004's record-setting prices.

The Class I price averaged \$17.65 per hundredweight in 2005, 58 cents below the 2004 annual average. The highest Class I price during 2005 was \$19.90 in January, \$4.48 less than the record high in June of 2004. The Class II price averaged 38 cents less than the previous year, and the Class IV price was down 32 cents from 2004. The Class III price declined the most, averaging \$1.34 per hundredweight less than the 2004 average. Overall, the statistical uniform price (blend) reported at Suffolk County, Massachusetts (Boston), averaged \$15.64 per hundredweight, 85 cents (5.1 percent) less than the 2004 price.

The Producer Price Differential (PPD) ranged from \$0.81 per hundredweight in February 2005 to \$2.24 per hundredweight in August 2005. The annual average PPD was \$1.60 per hundredweight. There were no negative PPDs reported at the Suffolk County, Massachusetts (Boston) zone. Some of the outer zones reported negative values during February and April 2005.

MILC Program

Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) payments were paid during June 2005, the only month during fiscal year (FY) 2005 where the Class I price reported at Boston fell below the \$16.94 per hundredweight trigger price. This payment equaled 3 cents per hundredweight, much lower than the 65 cents per hundredweight paid in FY 2004. The MILC program expired September 30, 2005. Current legislation is in the process that would extend the program until September 30, 2007. If passed, the payments would be retroactive to October 1, 2005. Since the Class I price for December was below the trigger, there would be additional payments for 2005.

Component Pricing

The price paid to producers for butterfat averaged \$1.7105 per pound, 16.6 percent less than the record-high \$2.0507 per pound in 2004. The per-pound annual average protein price declined 5.5 percent, from \$2.6035 per pound in 2004 to \$2.4602 per pound. The other solids price increased 63.5 percent, jumping from \$0.0751 to \$0.1228 per pound in 2005. The nonfat solids price rose 14.3 percent from \$0.6935 in 2004 to \$0.7929 per pound.

Producer Tests

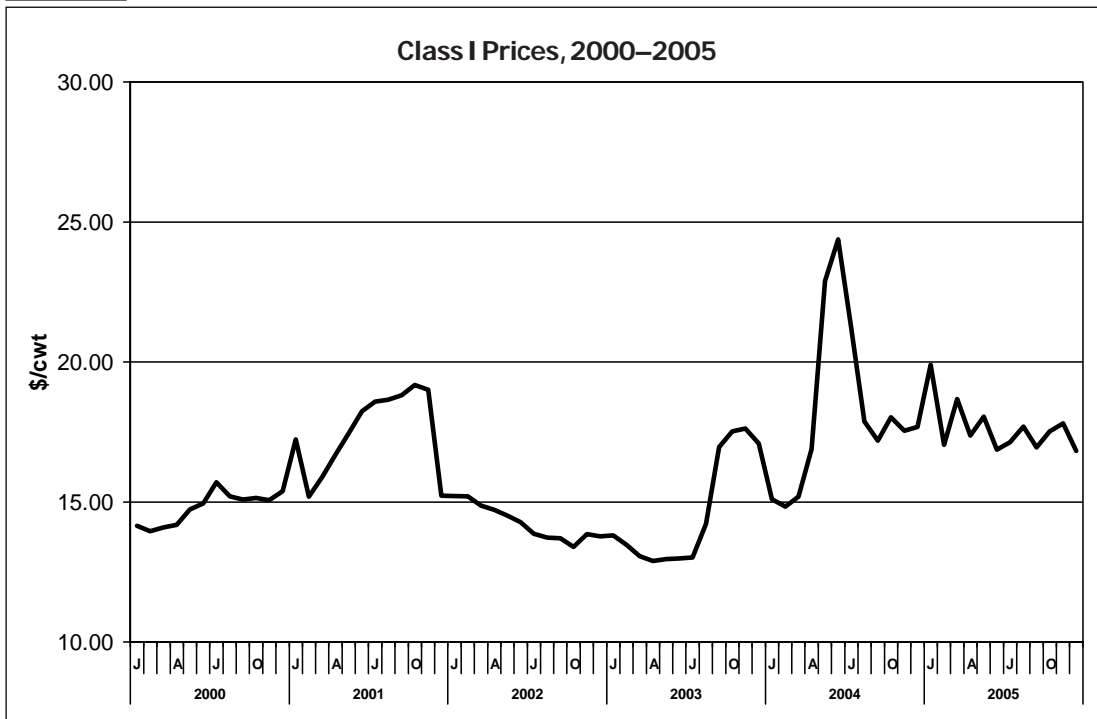
The annual average producer butterfat test was 3.67 percent, unchanged from 2004, although tests varied significantly throughout the year. The average protein test was 3.03 percent, 1 hundredth of a point less than the previous year while the other solids test averaged 5.69 percent, 2 hundredths of a point higher than 2004. ❖

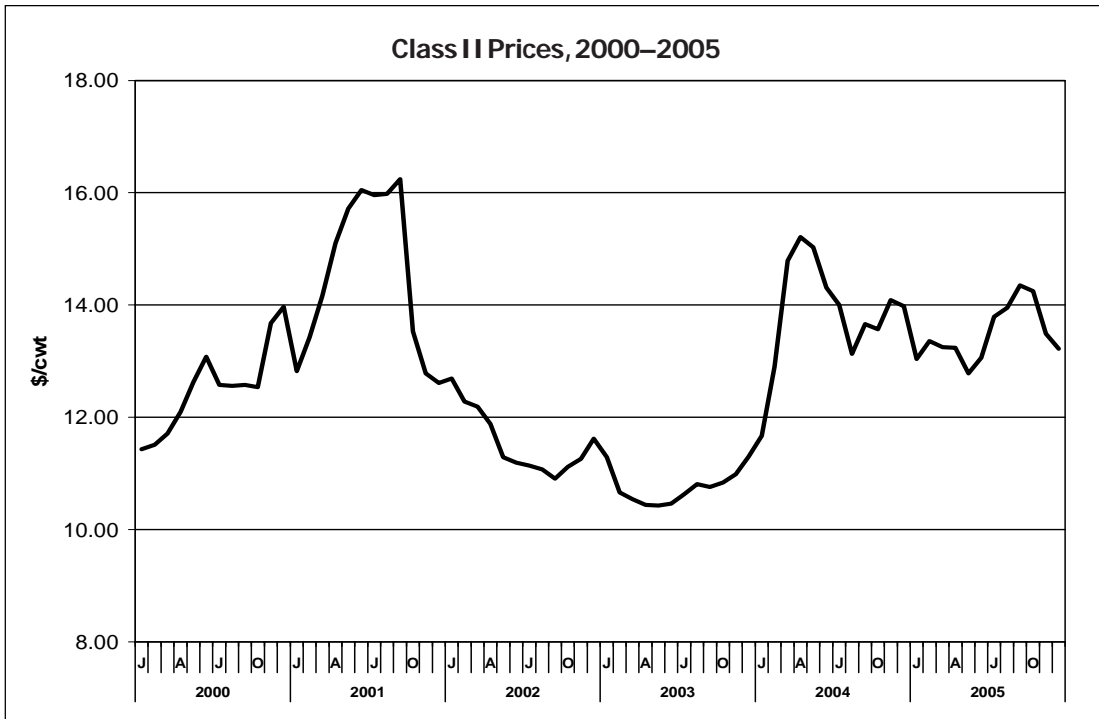

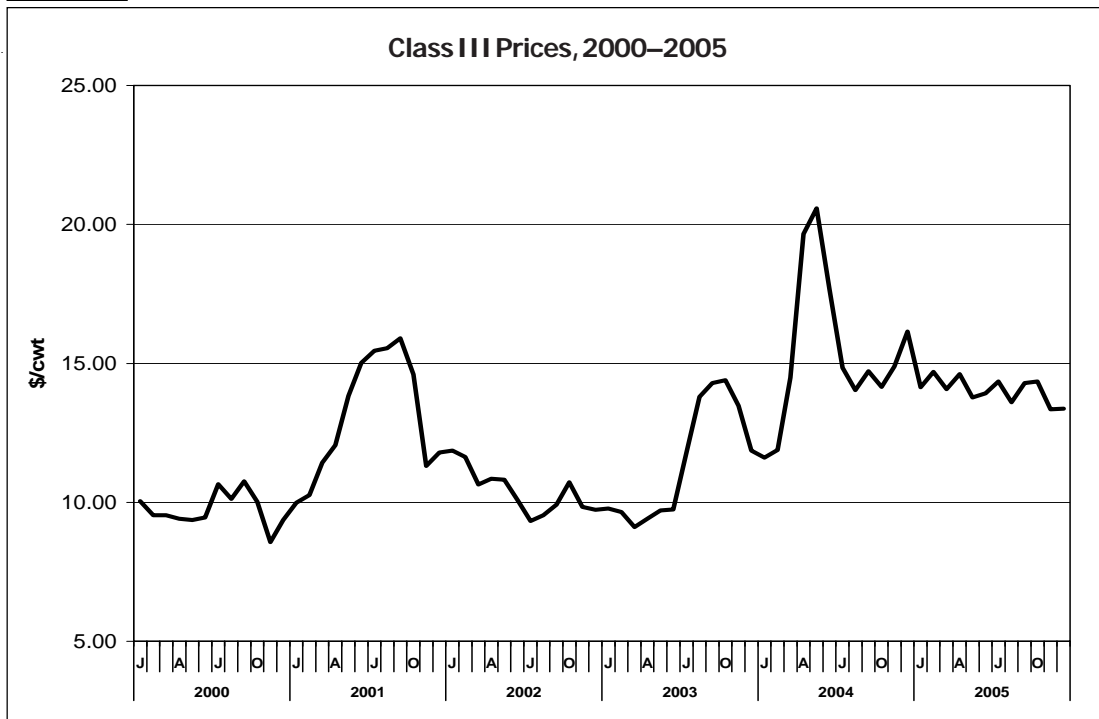

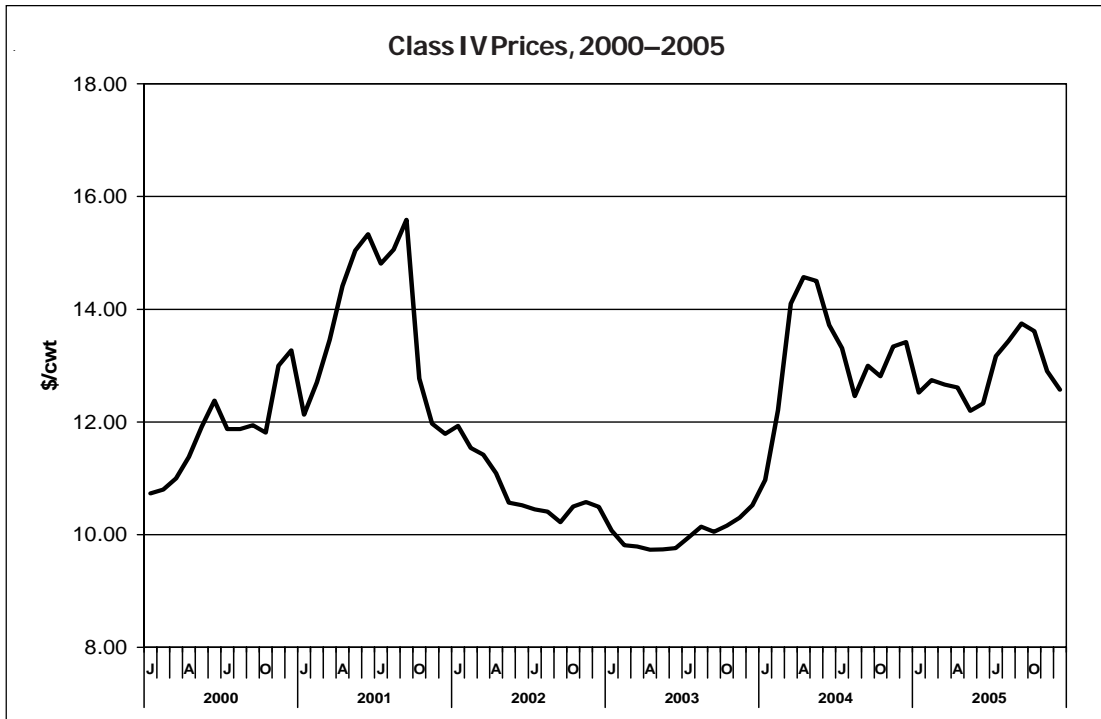

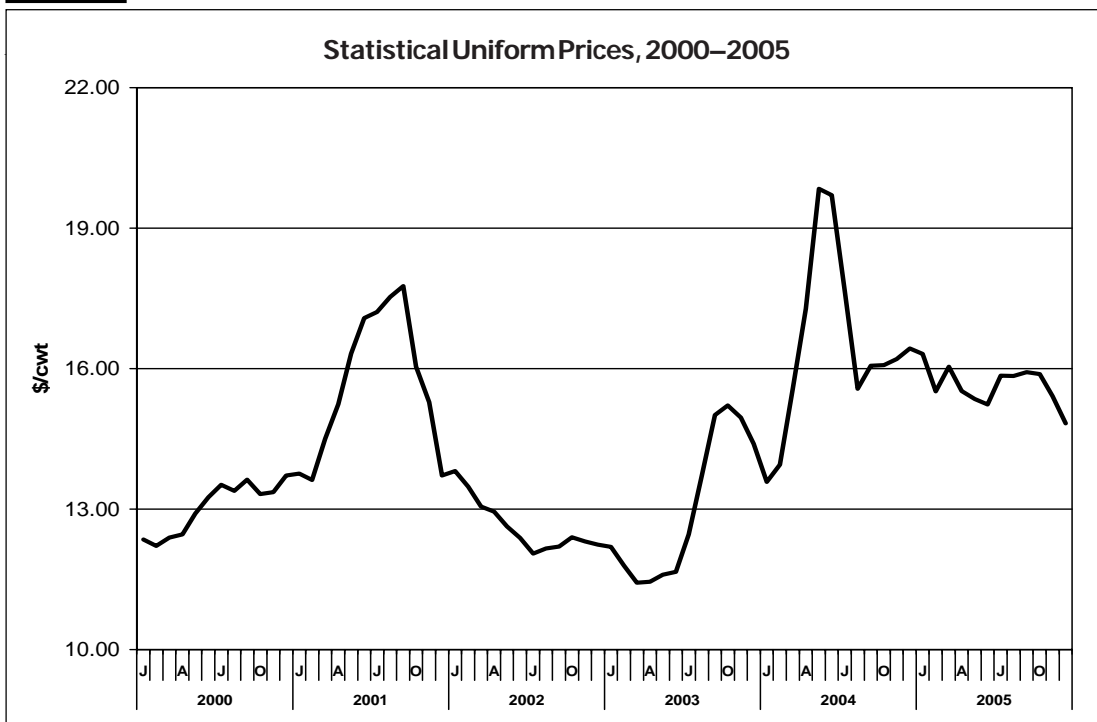
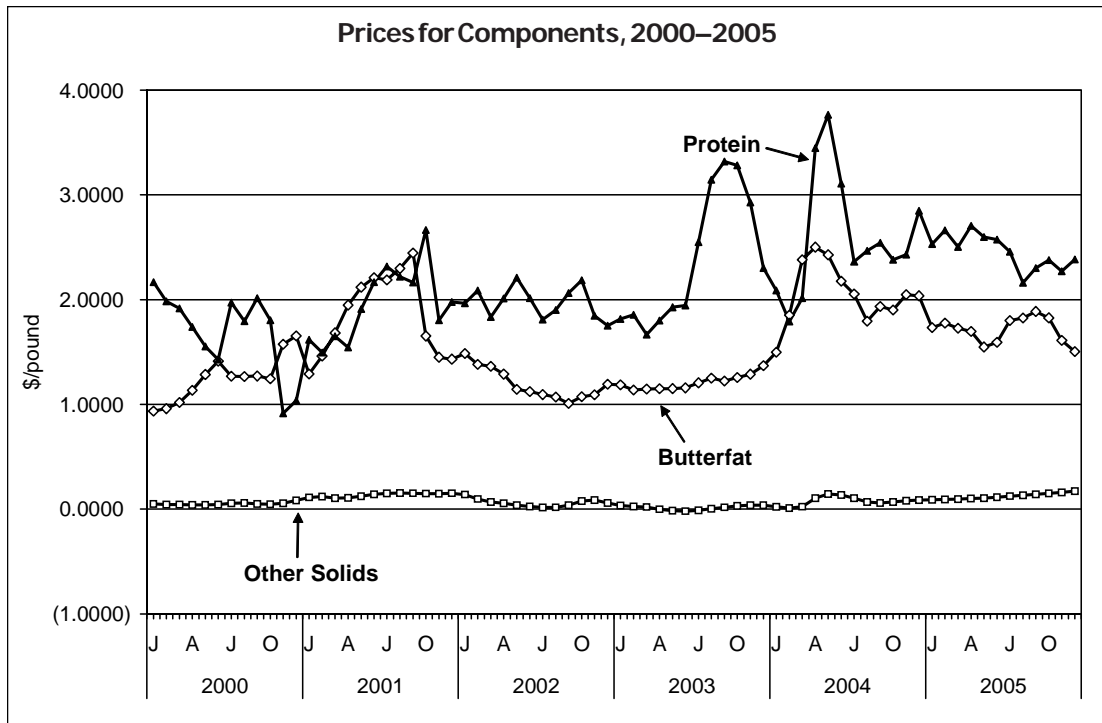


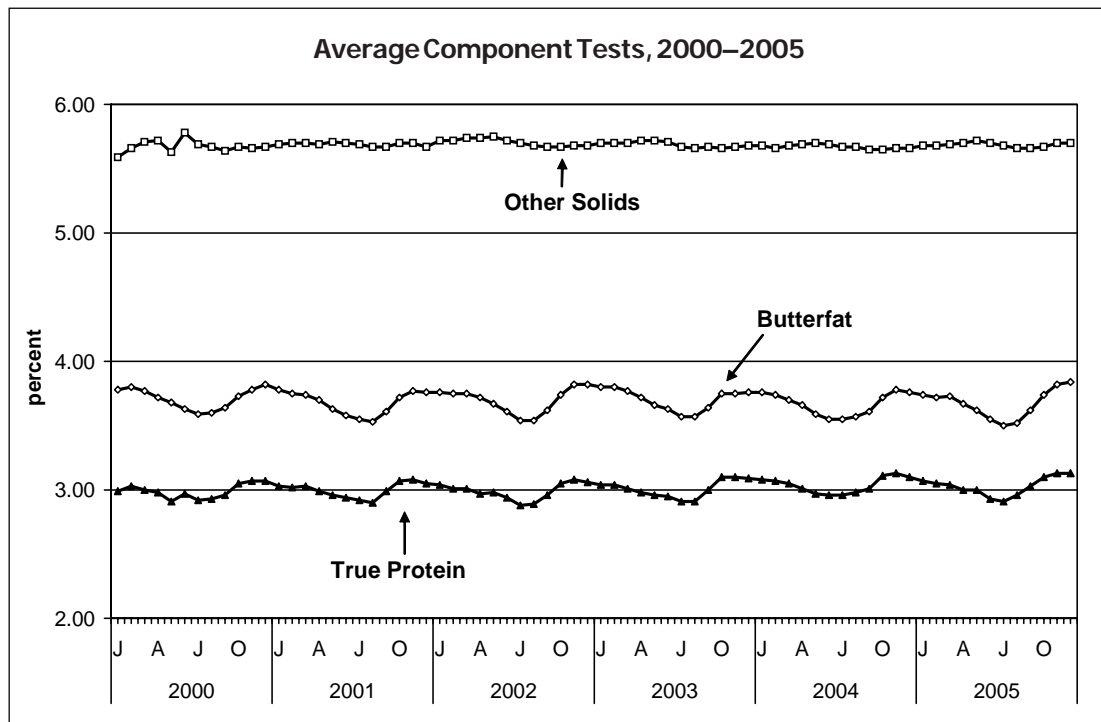

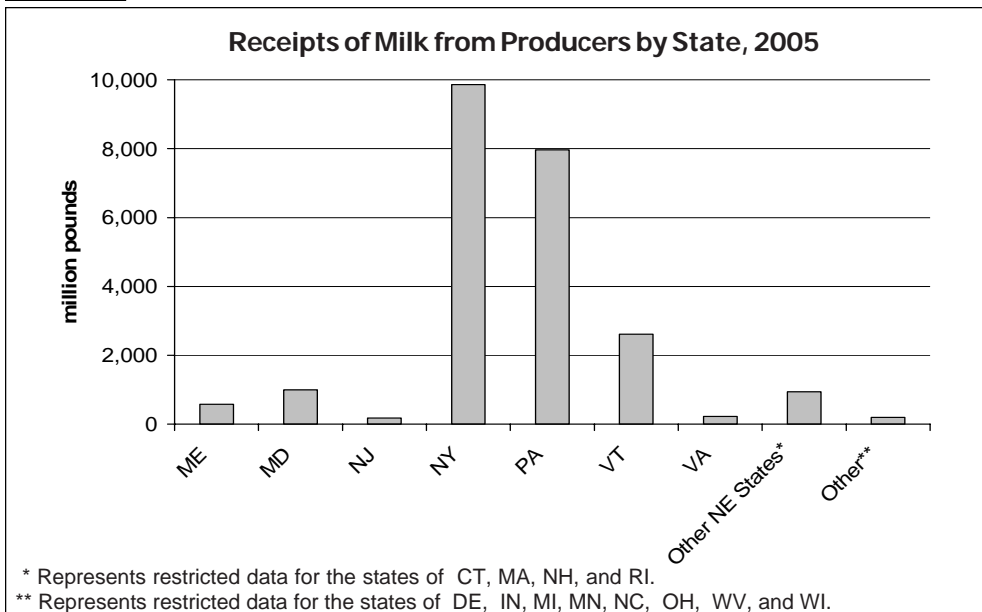

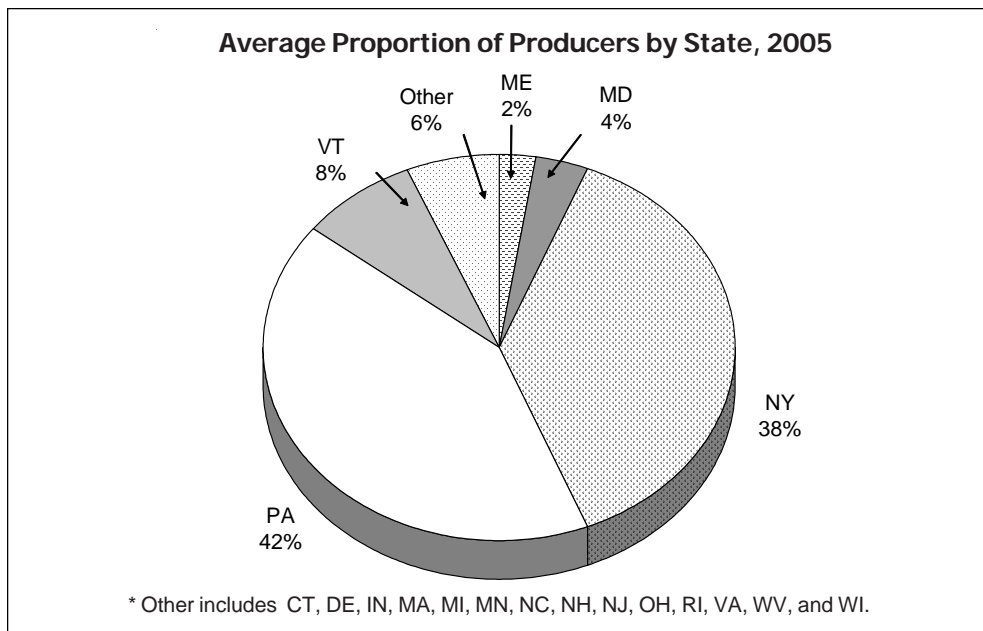

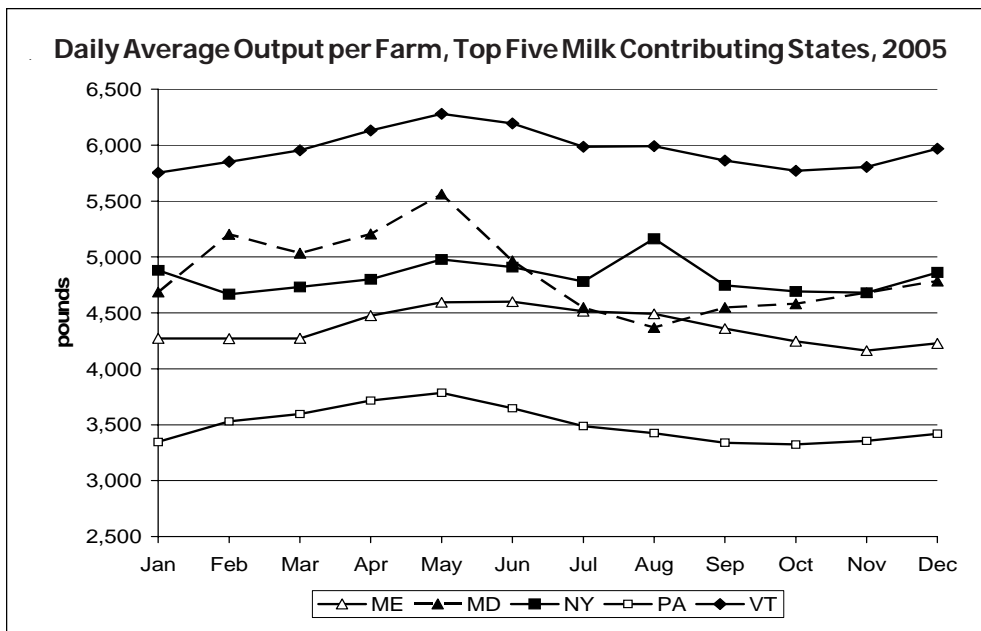

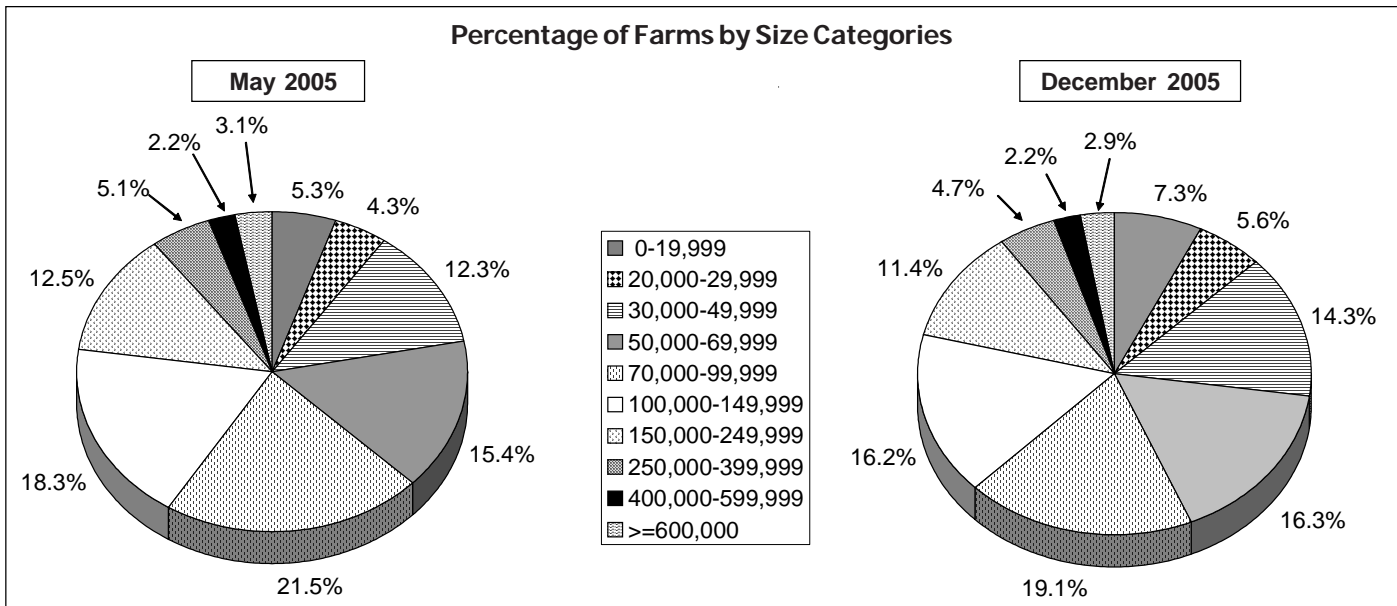

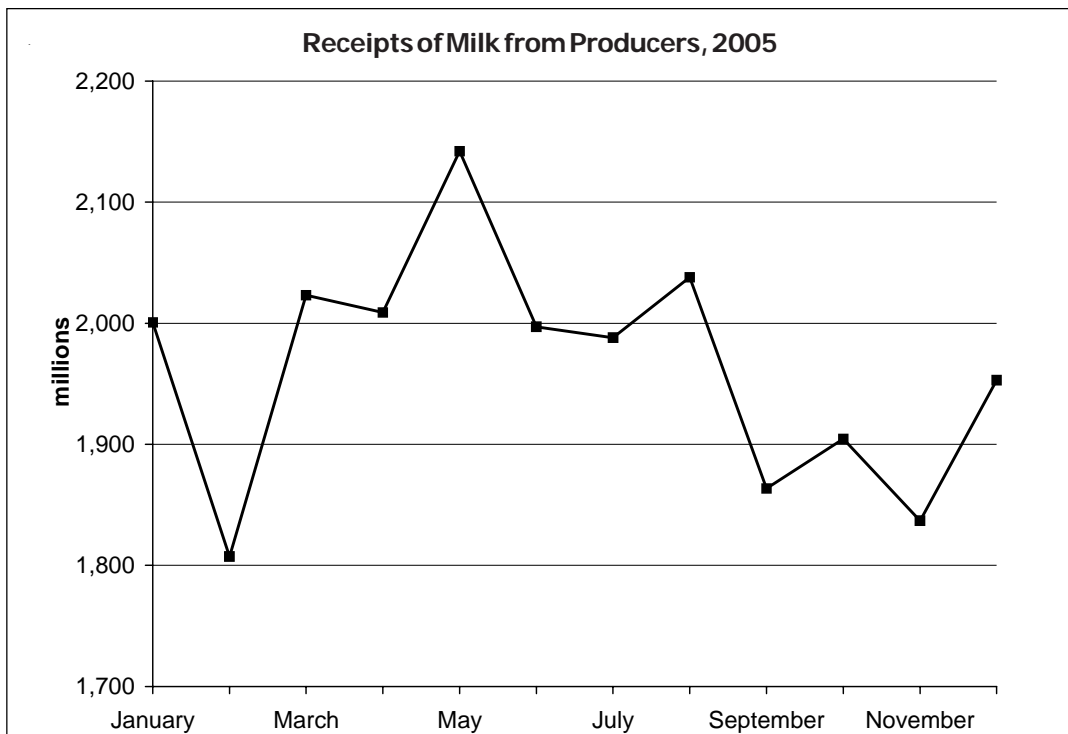

Bulletin Highlights—2005

January

The USDA announced a final decision that adopted changes to various reporting and payment deadlines as well as changes to the pooling and producer milk provisions of the Northeast Order.

A 5-year comparison of producer pay prices and milk receipts under the Northeast Order was given with tables for the years 2000 to 2004.

A summary was given of the Market Administrator marketing services' verification and calibration 2004 programs. A table showed the tank calibration work by tank size.

Mike Johanns was sworn in as the 28th Secretary of the USDA on January 21, 2005.

Other solids tests in the contiguous Northeast milkshed were discussed. A map illustrated the annual average other solids tests by county for 2003.

February

Total milk production in the United States during 2004 was relatively unchanged when compared to 2003. A table ranked the top ten milk producing states.

The Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) payments made to U.S. dairy farmers during the October 2003-2004 fiscal year were discussed, and a table showed the payments received by Northeast states.

Commercial disappearance was discussed with a table showing milk and selected dairy products for 2003-2004. Another table showed the 2004 year-to-year percent change in a 3-month moving total.

March

The USDA announced a final rule on April 11, 2005, implementing amendments to the Northeast Federal Milk Marketing Order to become effective on June 1, 2005.

The Northeast Order recorded its highest first quarter average uniform price since the Order's inception. A table gave the actual and forecasted uniform prices from January 2004 to June 2005.

The Market Administrator's bulk tank verification program tentative calibration truck schedule was given for 2005.

Information on the top ten contributing counties in terms of producer milk receipts pooled on the Northeast Order for 2004 was given, and a table provided selected statistics.

April

The USDA planned to hold a national public hearing on June 20, 2005, to consider proposals to amend the Class I fluid milk product definition in all federal milk marketing orders.

On April 12, 2005, the USDA announced a recommended decision that would amend the current provisions of the Pacific Northwest and Arizona-Las Vegas federal milk marketing orders.

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) released their *Dairy Products 2004 Summary*. A table showed total production and the annual change for selected products during 2003-2004.

Average milk production per cow nationally for January-March 2005 was discussed and illustrated with a map pointing out selected regions.

May

Significant changes to the Northeast Marketing Order that would become effective in June were explained.

The upcoming return of the MILC payments in June 2005 was explained. A table gave the actual and predicted class prices and MILC payments for 2005.

Sales of Class I fluid milk products in the Northeast Milk Marketing Area in 2004 were down from 2003, and a table showed pound and percent change information for 2003 and 2004. A chart illustrated per capita sales by product for 2004.

Cumulative producer milk receipts showed a leap-year adjusted increase for the first 4 months of 2005. A table showed total volume and percent utilization by class for the January-April period for 2004 and 2005 and the 5-year annual average class utilization.

June

The volatility of the Northeast Order's blend price was discussed. A chart illustrated the blend prices from the years 2000 to 2005, and a table gave annual average blend price statistics from 1990 to 2005.

Plant closings and new plant openings that affect the Order's utilization and the uniform price were discussed. Charts illustrated the four class utilizations for 2002, 2005, and hypothetical 2006.

July

Milk production in the United States increased significantly during the first 7 months of 2005 largely due to depooling in 2004.

Farm operations with a tanker load per day were compared by farm size and state and shown in a table.

A glimpse was taken at the large absorption of U.S. milk production by exports to overseas markets.

The prices and levels of milk components were given for the first 6 months of 2005. Charts showed tests for butterfat, protein, and other solids for 2004 and 2005, and the 4-year average for 2000 to 2004.

August

USDA Secretary Mike Johanns named Lloyd C. Day as Administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS).

Bulk milk movements by handlers pooled on the Northeast Order that were shipped to and received from handlers pooled on other federal orders during August were discussed.

The factors affecting a producer's gross income were explained, and an example of a hypothetical producer's total gross payment for August 2004 and 2005 was compared in an illustration.

Commercial disappearance figures showed demand to be strong during the first half of 2005, and a table gave the breakdown for milk and selected products for January–June, 2004 and 2005.

Broome County, New York, was identified as the weighted center of the Northeast Order total milk supply. A map illustrated the weighted average production center of the Northeast Order for May 2004 and 2005.

September

Bulk milk movements by handlers pooled on the Northeast Order that were shipped South increased during September.

Both cheese and butter prices on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange (CME) were less volatile in 2005 than 2004. Charts illustrated the weekly average CME prices for butter and block Cheddar cheese from January through October for 2004 and 2005.

The Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) purchases were the lowest since 1996. The CCC did not purchase any cheese or butter for the past two marketing years. A table showed CCC purchases from 1991 through 2005.

Information on the MILC program was given, and a table showed total MILC payments by state as of October 2005.

October

A USDA Administrative Law Judge held that Carb Countdown is not a Class I fluid milk product as defined by AMS, but was rather a Class II milk product.

The details of the mailbox price were given. A table showed the Northeast Order regional mailbox prices for January–July 2005.

The amendment to the Appalachian Order expanded its marketing area, which eliminated the ability to pool milk on that Order and on a state-operated order, and amended transportation credit provisions.

The 2005 Northeast Regional Dairy Outlook Conference was held November 15 at the Albany office. A table showed the statistical uniform prices for 2004, the actual and estimated prices for 2005, and the estimated prices for 2006.

November

The ruling by a USDA Administrative Law Judge that Carb Countdown was a Class II milk product also stated that HP Hood LLC was entitled to a refund. An explanation was given of how the reimbursement money would be deducted from the Northeast Order pool.

Net bulk milk shipments by handlers pooled on the Northeast Order to the South increased during October and November, but more milk was received from other federal orders than shipped from the Northeast Order.

The year-to-year changes in U.S. milk production and the uniform price from 1997 to 2004 and monthly changes for 2005 were contrasted and illustrated with a graph.

The amendments to the provisions of the Pacific Southwest and Arizona-Las Vegas milk marketing orders that affect producer-handlers were announced in a final decision.

The amendment to the Northeast Order changed the final payment date that non-member producers must be paid. A table showed the required dates when producers' partial payments are due for the 2006 months in which the milk was produced.

Plant closings and contractions in the Northeast were discussed and illustrated on a map.

December

USDA announced that it would hold a national public hearing on January 24, 2006, to consider a proposal to amend the Class III and Class IV milk price formula manufacturing allowances for all federal milk marketing orders.

Both cheese and butter prices on the CME were less volatile in 2005 than 2004, but both commodities averaged lower than the previous year. Charts illustrated the weekly average CME prices for butter and block Cheddar cheese for 2004 and 2005.

Northeast Order statistics for 2005 were summarized. A table showed selected pool statistics for 2004 and 2005.

There were no CCC purchases under the price support program in 2005. This was the first year that no purchases were made during an entire calendar year.
